Victims of the trade war emerge voice


Chinese consumers have not spoken out, but US blue-collar workers are beginning to worry. This seemingly puzzling scene is being staged in the context of the trade war provoked by the Trump administration. German cars have been among the first victims of Donald Trump's tariff policy: the victim on the surface is a German car company set up in the United States, and the potential victims are the employment opportunities of American auto workers.

On July 30th, Germany's BMW Motors increased the sales price of two of its sport utility vehicles, which are produced in the US and exported to China, by 4 percent and 7 percent respectively due to increased costs. It is not difficult to find the reasons for the increase in costs, as the price of globally-purchased parts for American-made BMWs has risen since the Trump administration launched a trade offensive against multiple countries and on multiple lines. At the same time, as one of the counter-measures against the United States, China began imposing a 25 percent increase on the newly-implemented 15 percent tariff on imported cars from the United States on July 6th. This amounts to a 40 percent tax. This means that the market share of name-brand cars with US origins will be reduced due to price increases.

When the White House fired the first shot in the trade war against its major trading partners by levying tariffs on steel and aluminum, many industry insiders noted that cars and electronic products would likely be the first to bear the brunt. This is because the world's largest automakers are heavyweight multinationals, with factories around the world.

The Financial Times has quoted a professional analyst as describing the impact of the trade war on the global automotive industry as a "perfect storm." "Perfect" in this case means a combination of factors that could yield a fatal blow to the global automotive industry. In meteorology, storms develop through changes in barometric pressure. To prevent US job losses, the White House is the only one with the ability to send the trade winds in the right direction to help create a barometric balance and prevent an automotive 'super storm.' $(Abridged\ from\ CRI)$

Chinese-American writer inspired by true story of "Flying Tiger"

"World War Two... China... One cousin's courage, another's determination to help a wounded American Chinese-American writer Iris Yang's heartwrenching story is now a hot sale in the United States.

Fresh from the print in June, Yang's English novel, Wings of a Flying Tiger, has been well received by readers and book reviewers.

'It is a heroic tale in which ordinary Chinese risked their lives to rescue and safeguard a downed American pilot in WWII in China," said Yang, adding that she based the book on

true experience of Tex Hill, the "Flying Tigers" member who was rescued by Chinese villagers.

The "Flying Tigers," or the American Volunteer Group (AVG), was a band of about 300 pilots and ground staff who volunteered to help China fight invading Japanese troops before the United States officially entered WWII.

The novel is framed in the summer of 1942, when Danny Hardy bails out of his fighter plane into a remote region of western China. With multiple injuries, malaria, and Japanese



troops searching for him, the American pilot's odds of survival are slim.

Yang was born and raised in Wuhan, capital city of China's middle province Hubei, relocated to America in the 1980s for study, and settled down in North Car-

"I'm working on a story based on my grandmother. My grandma's life was a mix of triumphs and tragedies. I'll try my best to write it down," said Yang.

Yunnan has set up the Yunnan Flying Tigers Research Association and the Yunnan Flying Tigers Museum since 2007, and published a large number of research works on the Flying Tigers. At the same time, it established partnerships with American authorities and non-government organizations.

The Association goes to different places to excavate the remains of the flying tigers and discovered the largest cluster of relics in Chenggong, Kunming recently. It has hosted dozens of visiting flying tiger veterans and relatives and helped more than 200 of them find their relatives.

Sun Guansheng, President of the Association, said that they will make new contributions to deepening Sino-US nongovernmental exchanges and carrying on the friendship between China and the United States.
